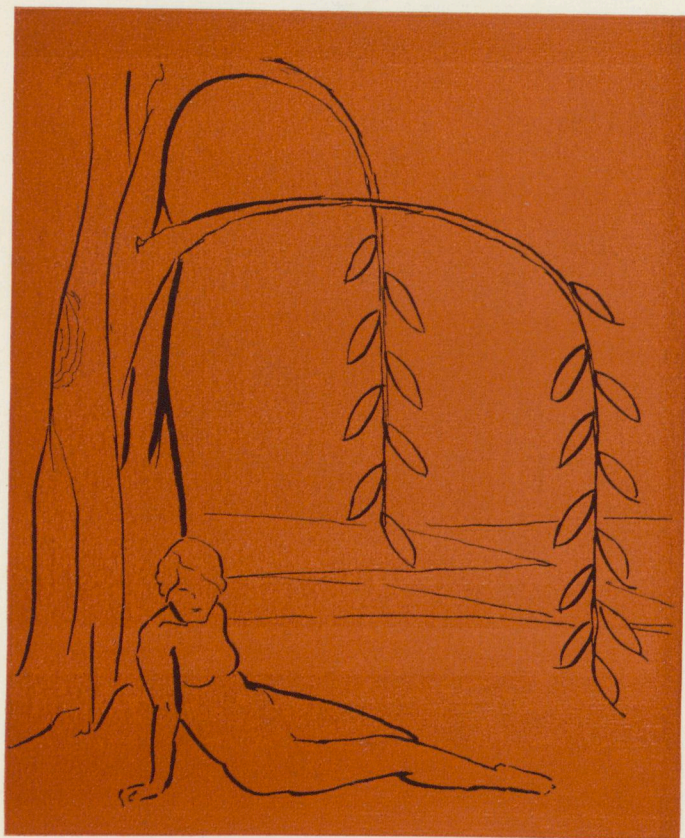
WESTMINSTER CHURCH

Wooster opened its 1935 football season with a 41-9 victory over an inexperienced Hiram team. 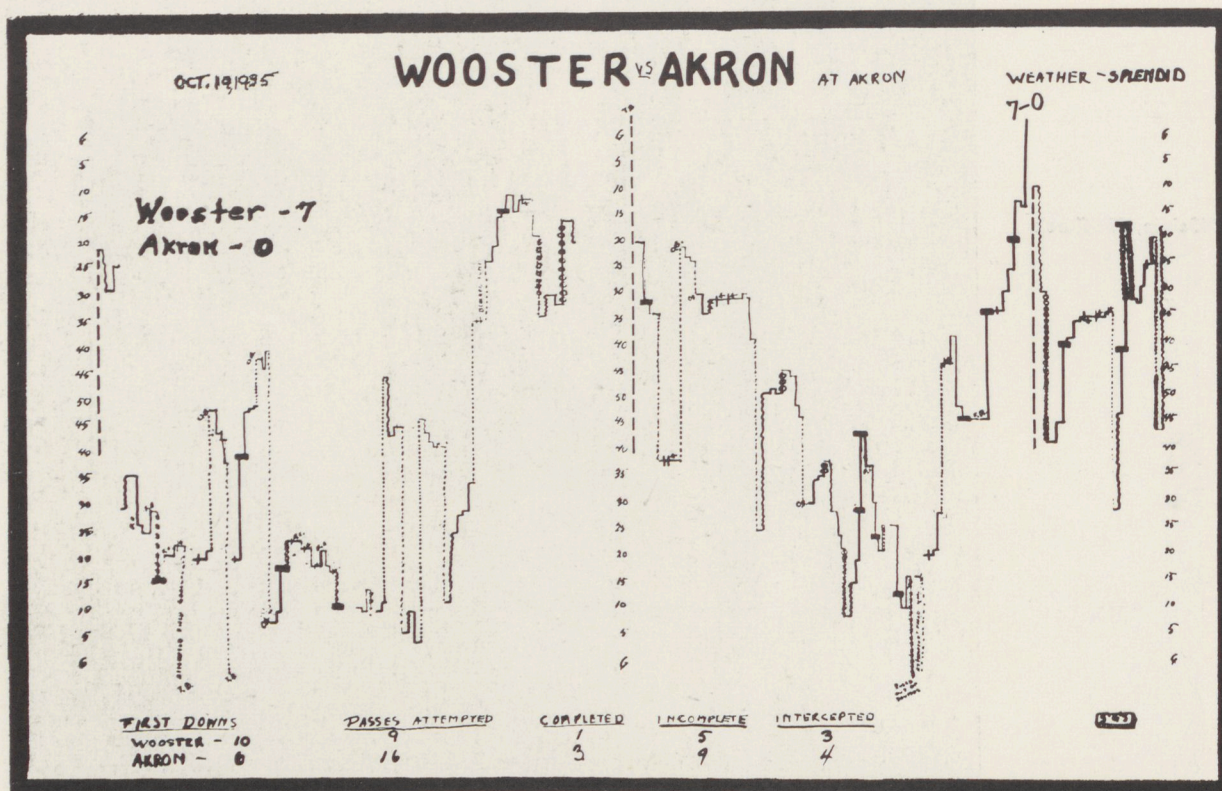

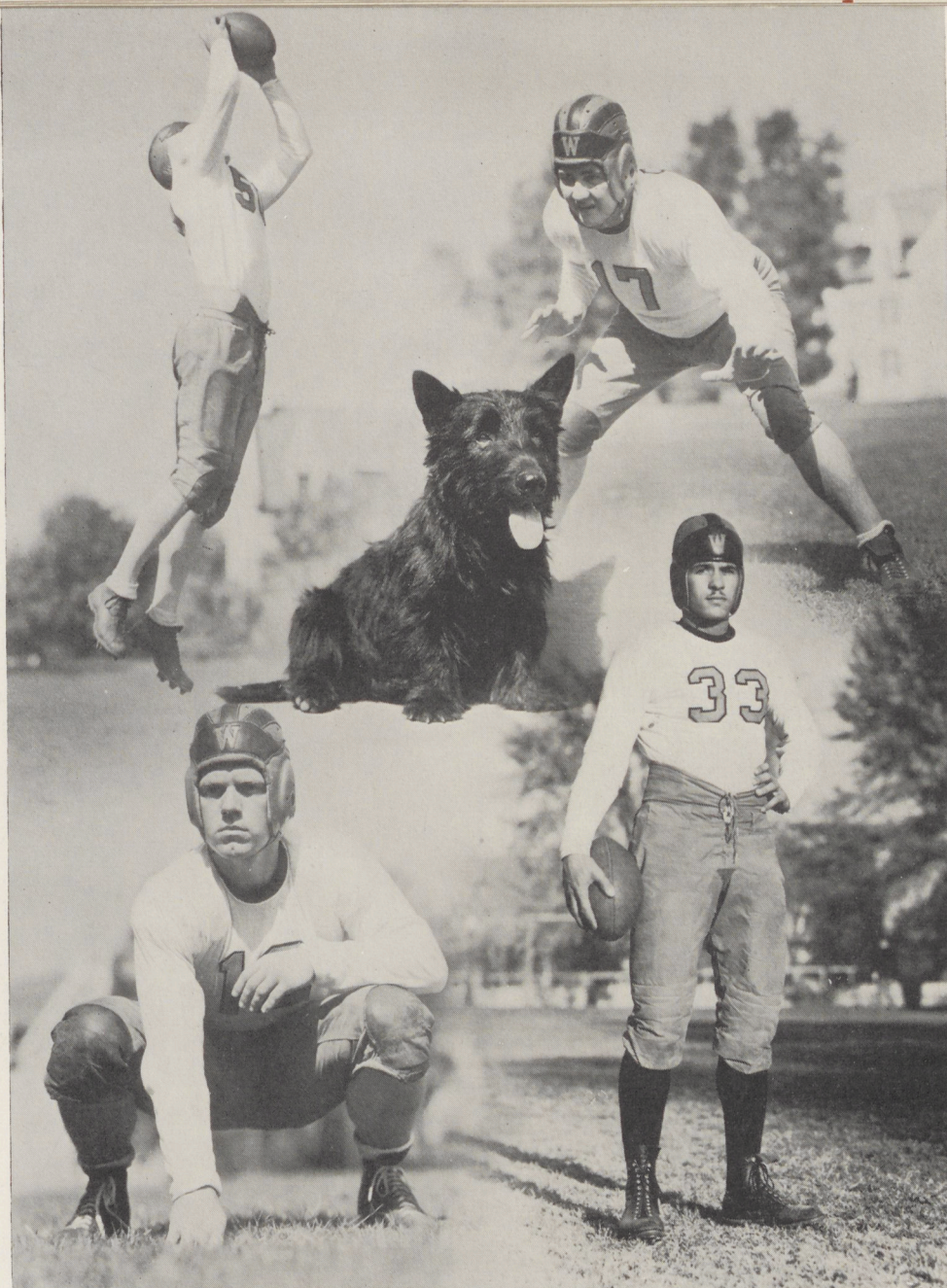
STATISTICIAN'S-EYE VIEW OF FOOTBALL GAME

SEASON OF

This year Wooster College had a fast, scrappy aggregation of basketball players. Winning ten Ohio Conference games while losing only five placed Wooster near the top in the Conference standings.

Opening the season the Scots got off to a poor start by losing to Wittenberg, 48-35. In the first home game of the year the Scots drubbed John Carroll 41-30 in a fast scoring offensive spree. Wooster displayed considerable strength over a highly rated Denison team and upset the Big Red 50-35.

Although outscoring the Mount Union team the first half by a big margin the Scots coasted the second half until the Purple caught up, and won the game 36-31. But Wooster came back to win from Oberlin in a fast game, 54-48. In this game Frascella set a new individual scoring record of 33 points for one game.

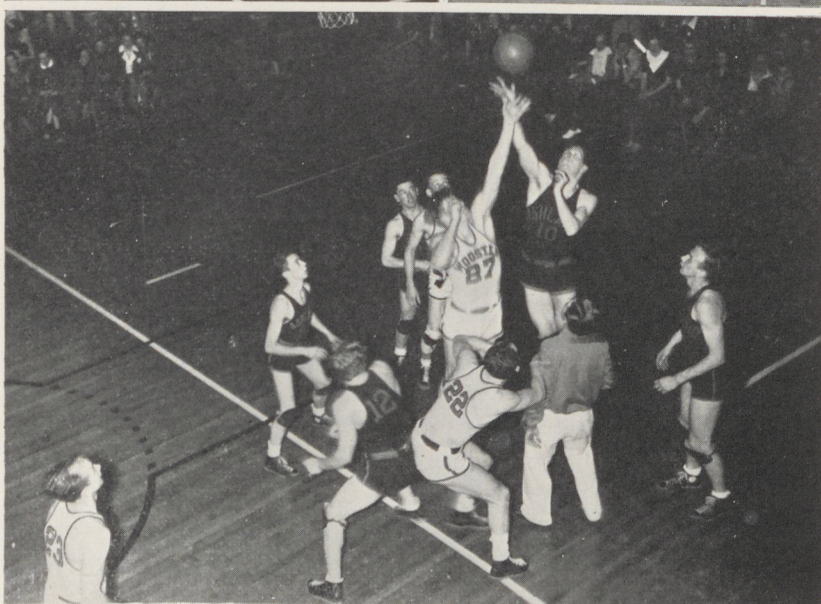

The Scots took an easy triumph over Ashland on the Ashland court, 55-41. The home game with Case was a repetition of the thriller at Cleveland, with the Scots again victorious, 40-38.

The Scots lost to Baldwin-Wallace 52-26 on their floor, but in the next game they won over Muskingum, 43-36.

In the second game with Mount Union Wooster was again defeated 51-41 at Alliance. But the Scots repaid Akron when they defeated the Zippers 58-45 with a fast attack on the home floor. The season closed with a 44-38 victory over Ashland.

In the second game of the year the Scots' nine vanquished Capital University 10-7. Capital claimed the Ohio Conference championship in baseball last year.

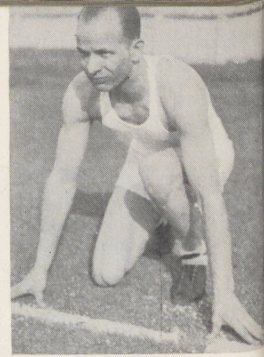
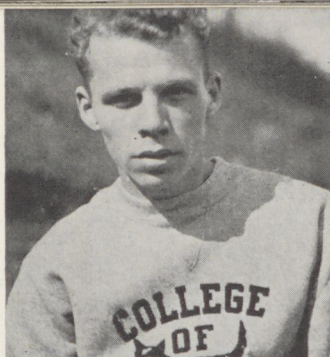
A pitching staff of Gotshall, Boren, Fuhrman, Snyder, and Rees was unequalled in the Conference.

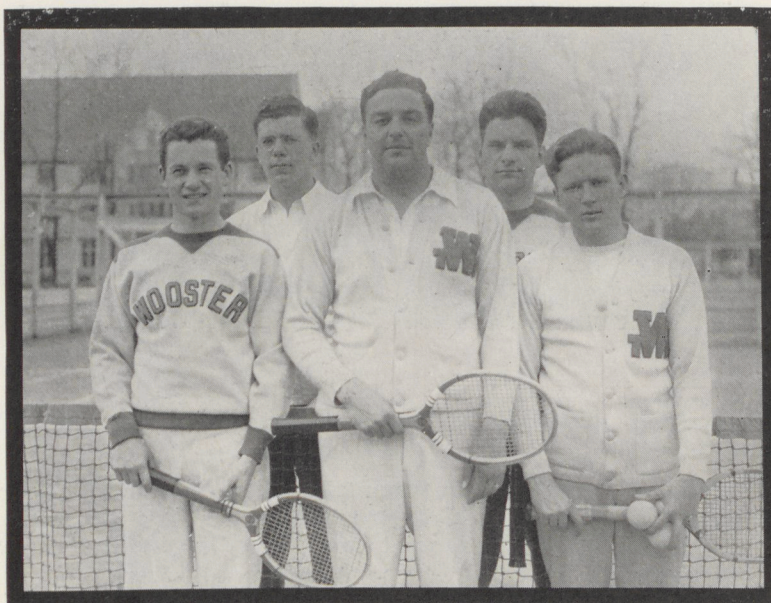
