#### ACTION IS RESULT OF FELL CRIME

### Confession Wrung from Culprits by Amazing Bluff, Followed by Well-known Tortures of The Inquisitorial Den.

A sad note was struck amidst the joys of this holiday season when the action taken by the discipline committee at their last meeting was announced today. The "Inquisition of the West", as the body was laughingly termed by an ex-student of Wooster College, has been closeted in their chambers for the past two days, together with twenty-one men of the school who were arraigned before them on the charge of whistling on Sunday.

This morning, notices were sent out that twenty of the men had been found guilty and expelled without further ado from the University. The twenty-first man produced an alibi, saying that he was not whistling, but that that was his natural way of breathing, as he had adenoids.

When, after being closeted with the Committee all night, the twenty men staggered forth into the cold, gray dawn this morning, their faces told the stories of their terrible sufferings more graphically than the most facile pen. Ten of them succumbed under the torture and had to be taken to the hospital in a coal truck. The stories told by the survivors rival in terrific cruelty the most sanguine tales from the times of the old Spanish Inquisition.

bers of the faculty reached an apparent climax last night when Dr. Kelso and Prof. Moore clinched in a fierce hand-to-hand battle by Abraham Lincoln's statue, and were only separated after some one with unusual presence of mind had carried a bucket of water and thrown on them.

It was known that the bitterness between the two factions had become excessive, but this was the first intimation given to the public that it had reached the point of open combat. ## Many Students Visit Museum At Metropolis

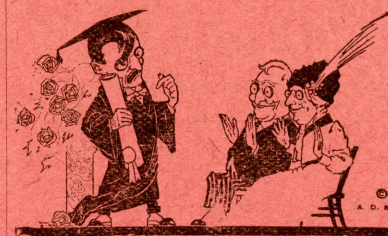
### Great Works of Art Seen by Enthusiastic Crowd

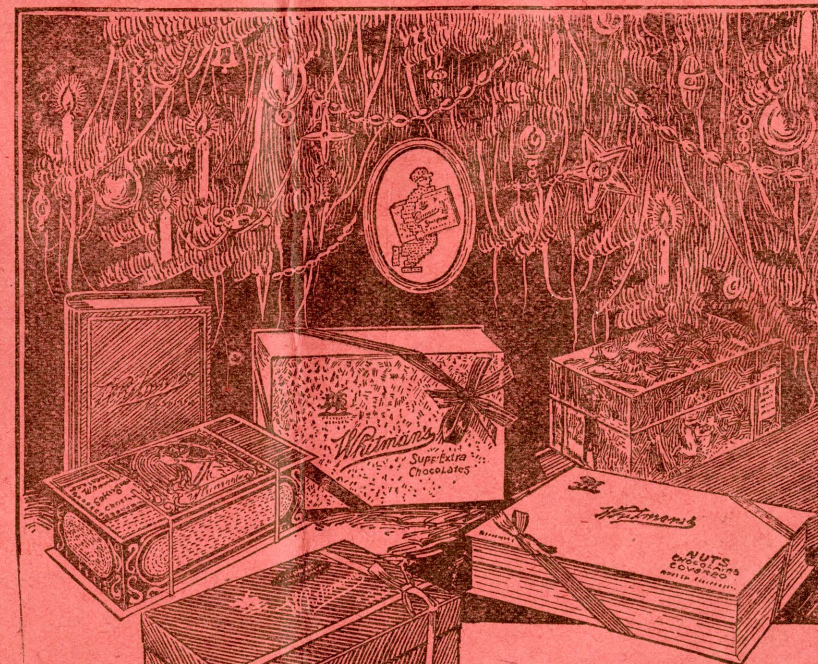

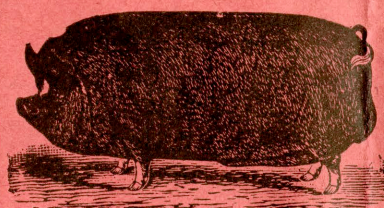

# GREAT SCIENTIST REVEALS AMAZING FACTS HITHERTO UNDREAMT OF BY POPULACE

"Of course the plague worked havoc among the amoebic population," he continued. "Before we were able to stop its ravages, ninety-five percent of the female and eighty percent of the male amoebae were dead. And it was only because of the well-known W. P. Spencer anti-toxin that was developed", (he cast down his eyes modestly) "that the others were saved".
