A GLIMPSE OF DR. LOWRY

Five minutes late for her class, a freshman girl drew a last big breath and started on a final sprint to first hour philosophy. Rounding a corner toward her a familiar figure tipped his hat and called, "Tell him I detained you." Poise returned to the freshman as she thought, "What a President!"

At the beginning of the year when the freshmen gather in Taylor Hall for their first orientation lecture, most are homesick, bewildered, and dubious; Dr. Lowry's words relieve the tension, give many a renewed faith in themselves, and create a sense of anticipation toward the future. Later, while they and the upper classmen begin to realize some of their expectations of education, Dr. Lowry tackles his job of promoting the scheme of a liberal education and gaining the means to make such an education possible for us who attend Wooster. Although his job frequently keeps him away from school, from his chapel talks we become familiar with Dr. Lowry's hobbies, tastes in music, literature and sports, his political views, his quick twists of humor, his humility, and strengthening religious convictions. One of Dr. Lowry's deepest concerns is with us as students. Perhaps this is best revealed in his own words.



"I Wish for you:

Some moment you may see more sharply than ever before the glory of the world about you for its own sake.

High moments that will come to you just out of the actual processes of your own mind. I hope you will see some pet rumor or theory or piece of propaganda utterly splintered by the clear axe of fact.

That you may know . . . some moment of real understanding and feeling of what gratitude is, because this is what really civilizes us.

Some enjoyment of an athletic sport.

That you may come to know, believe, and act upon it that fifteen minutes a day—a half hour is much better—spent utterly alone, rightly used, and preferably unconnected with anything that you have to worry about at the time, can be the difference between existence and living.

A growth of practical shrewdness. I hope you'll learn how not to be taken in so often. I hope you'll learn the value of a dollar . . .

A breath of concern for something that moves out beyond the boundaries of your own self—and hope that the horizon of your mind in these matters will not be bounded by Beall Avenue, Bever Street, and Wayne Avenue.

The luxury of joining one good cause fairly early, reflectively chosen, and stayed with even after it has been lost.

The experience of one or more absolute friendships . . . You know there are some relationships in life that are beyond

circumstance and whim and all relative concern, and when once felt, will never lead you into the narrow prism of some hothouse of constricted sentimentality, but will free you and through one or more people in whom you really believe, you can move into the understanding and enjoyment and appreciation of so many more.

Some really robust encounter with some work of art or literature or music that will raise the whole level of your mind and soul to the point you will want to go and cheer and say 'How poor I was 'til this happened.'

A belief that good manners . . . are not little trivial things that Emily Post described in her wisdom but that they are the means to human freedom.

The discovery of some quietness at the center of your being—where you can permanently enjoy something that is beyond the awful commotion in our own nerves.

At least once this year you may pray and believe that God has heard you.

A belief in great persons, the living and the dead; for in the long run, they're what educate us, and humility before them . . . civilizes a man.

That . . . every man and woman here can have the joy of knowing what creative work really is.

I give you these fifteen wishes in the confident belief that God does somehow love the folks who try. That is why you never walk alone."

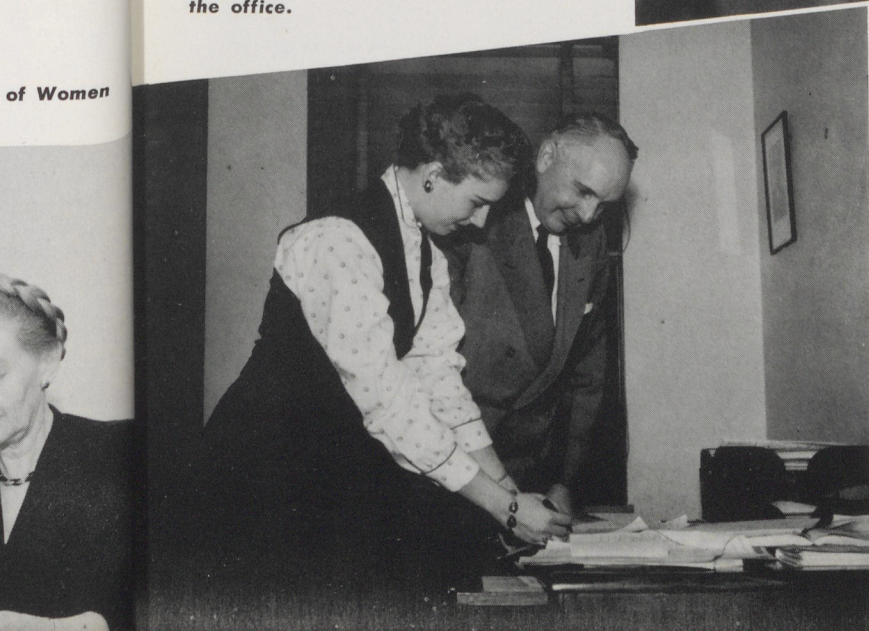

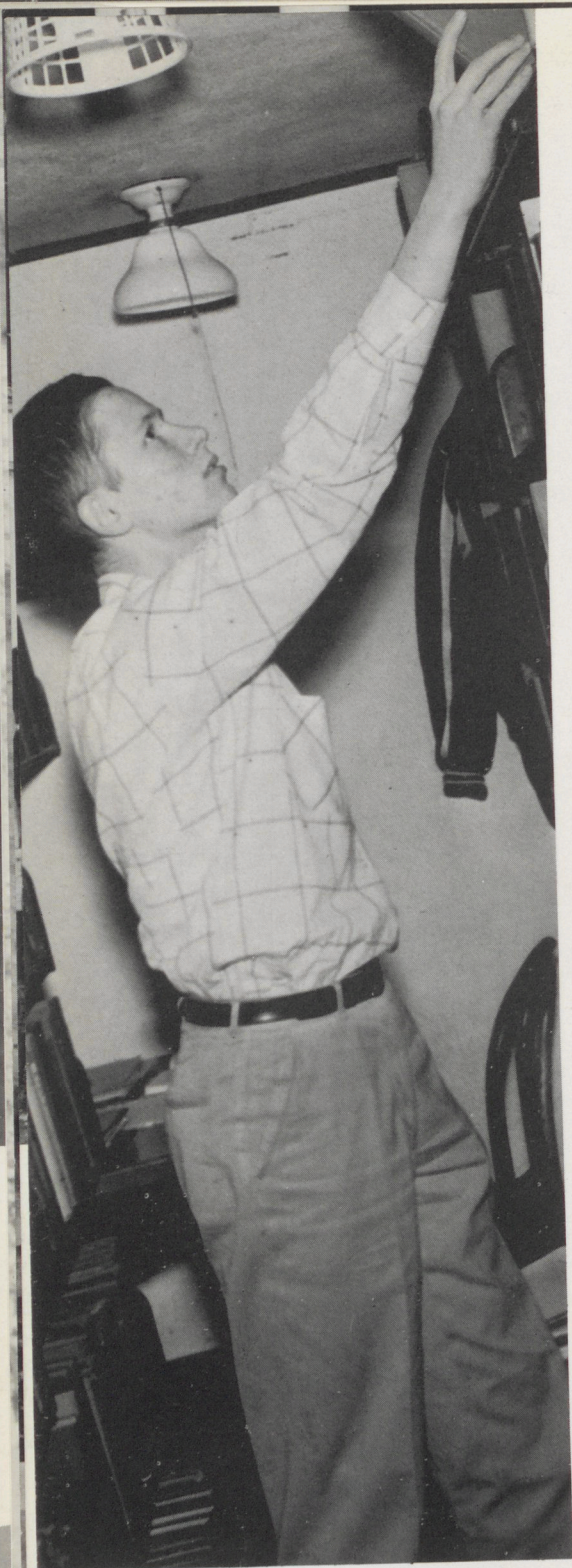

WOOSTER PAST TO PRESENT

Most of us who have been in Wooster awhile are familiar with Dr. Lowry's habit of keeping a list of things he wants the College to have. In this he follows the tradition of men who have watched and prayed to create a school which would both educate and inspire its students. Beginning as the dream of a Presbyterian minister, idealized through five years of continuous and often discouraging labor of dedicated men, the University of Wooster was officially opened in 1870. In its first year the College had an enrollment of thirty-four; the President, Willis Lord, who also served as a professor, was ably backed by five faculty members. From this beginning change and growth continued steadily.

Our Wooster is quite different from that of 1870. It has more than one thousand students, with almost one hundred on the faculty. We choose our courses from twenty-four departments which adequately cover the natural and physical sciences, and the humanities. The buildings we use today, Kauke, Taylor, Scovel, Severance Hall and gymnasium, were erected after the single class building, Old Main, burned in 1901. In this crisis, the President, Dr. Holden, by auda-

ciously frank and critical argument, persuaded Andrew Carnegie to break his stubborn custom of refusing to finance denominational colleges. With the gifts of Carnegie and Severance, plus those of alumni and friends, the school overcame her loss and the new equipment surpassed the old. The most recent innovation has been the introduction of Independent Study to the curriculum. It is a program in which the student can take a topic in his field of specialization, devote exhaustive research to it, and write an original paper under the supervision of a faculty member who is well acquainted with the problem being explored. Behind this obvious development of Wooster there was and is a constant and driving purpose.

It has been to inculcate into each student who seeks for wider understanding a basically broad education within the framework of Christianity, which should enrich his entire life. The growth of the College, the heritage of achievements by past graduates, and the contributions to the future which society may expect from us—all these justify this ideal which has always inspired the workers and dreamers who give life to Wooster.

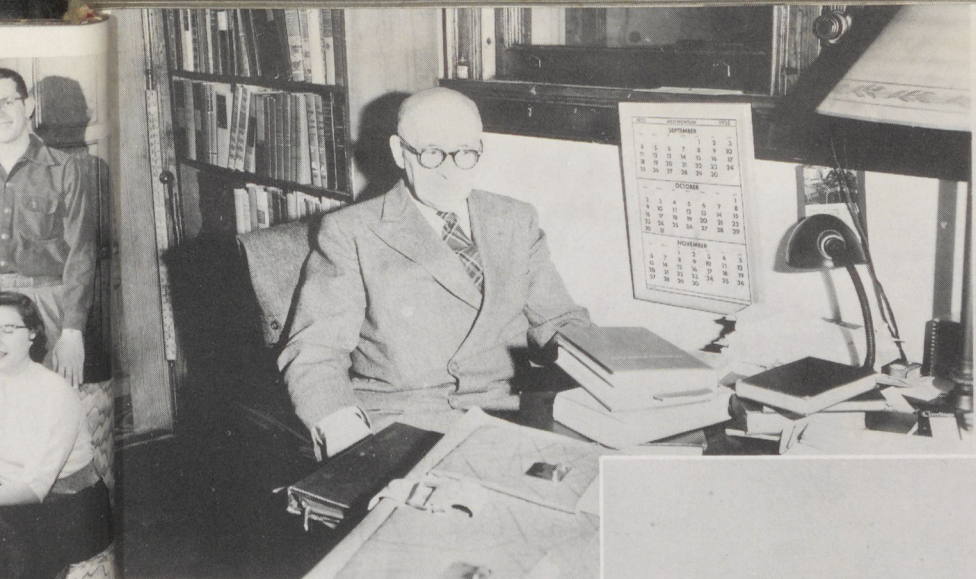

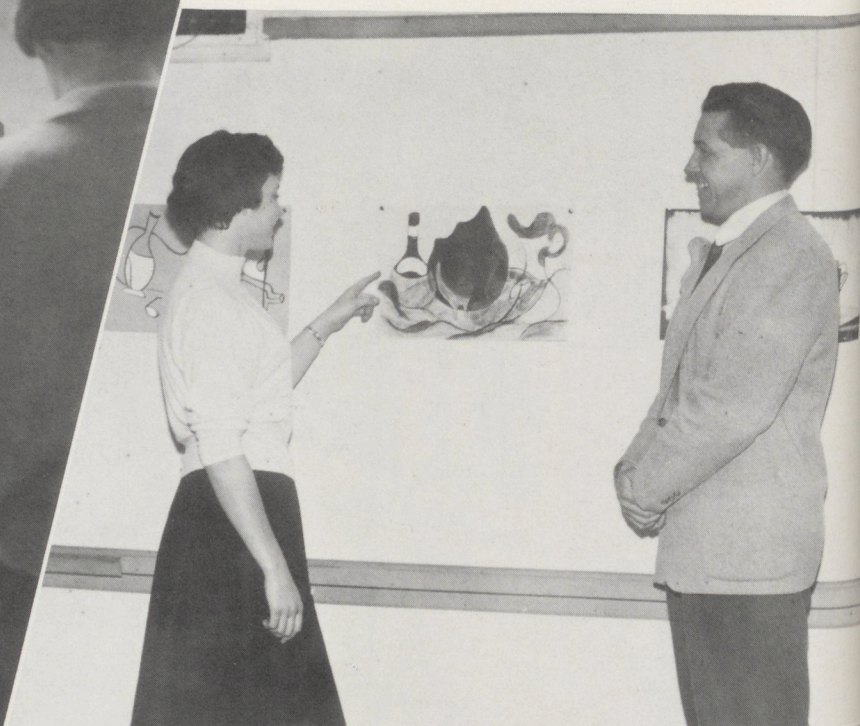

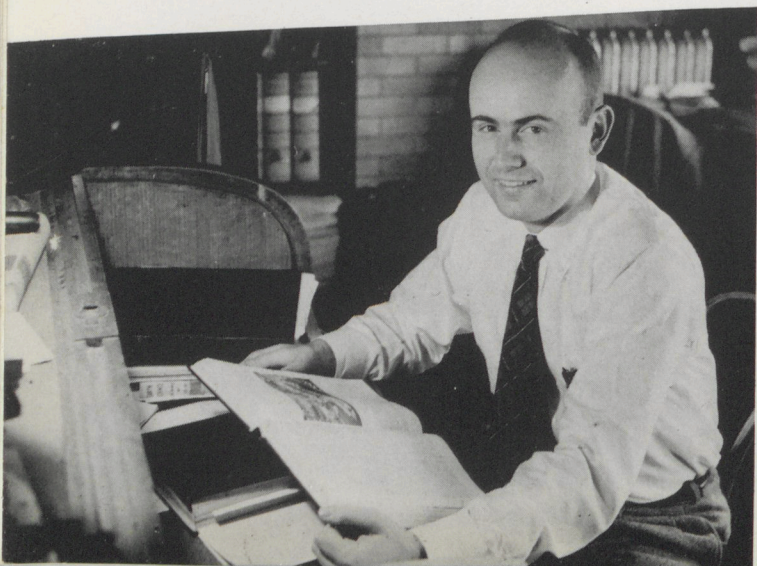

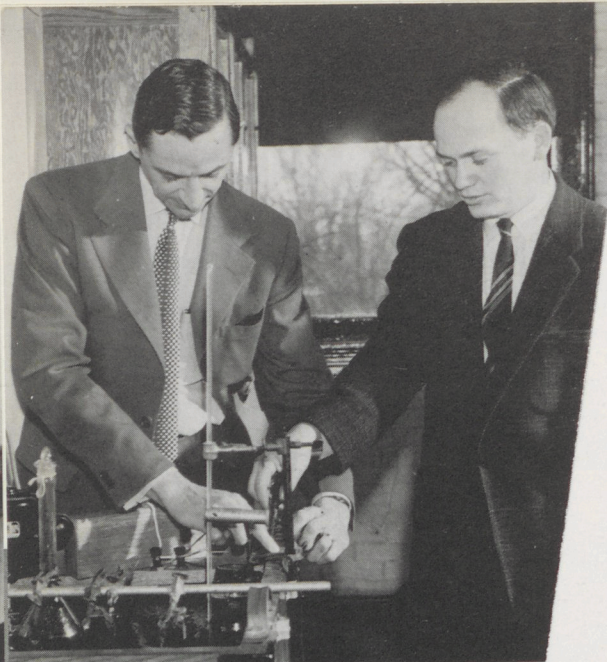

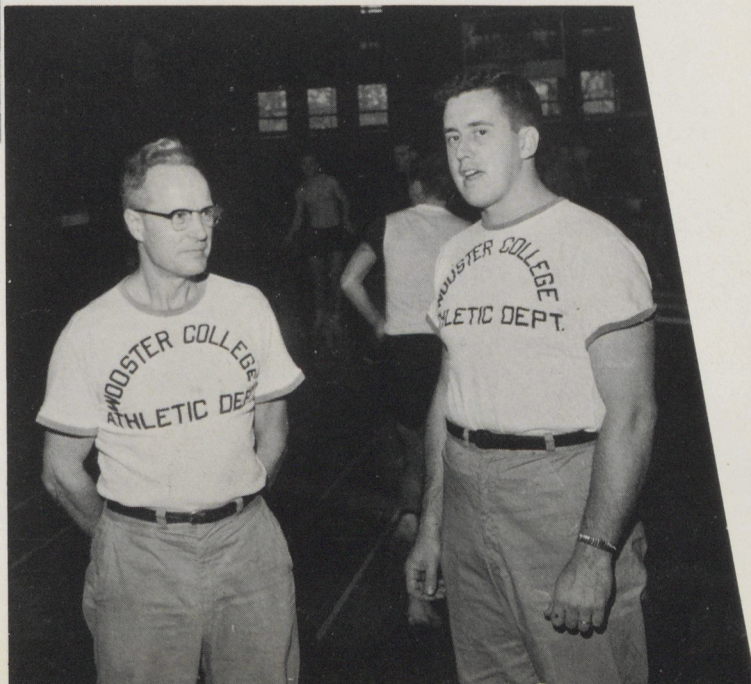

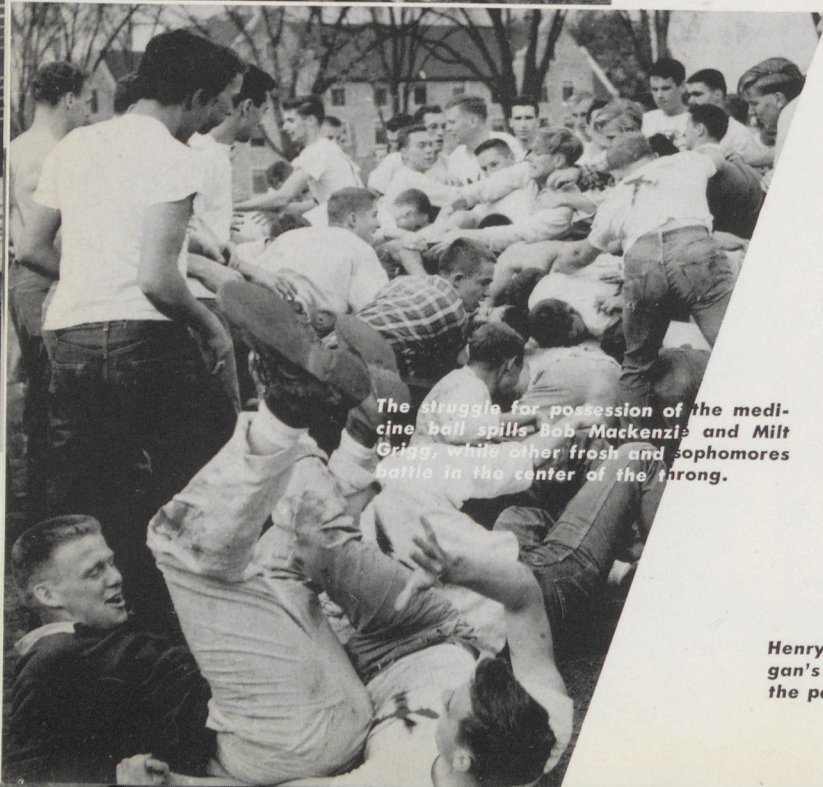

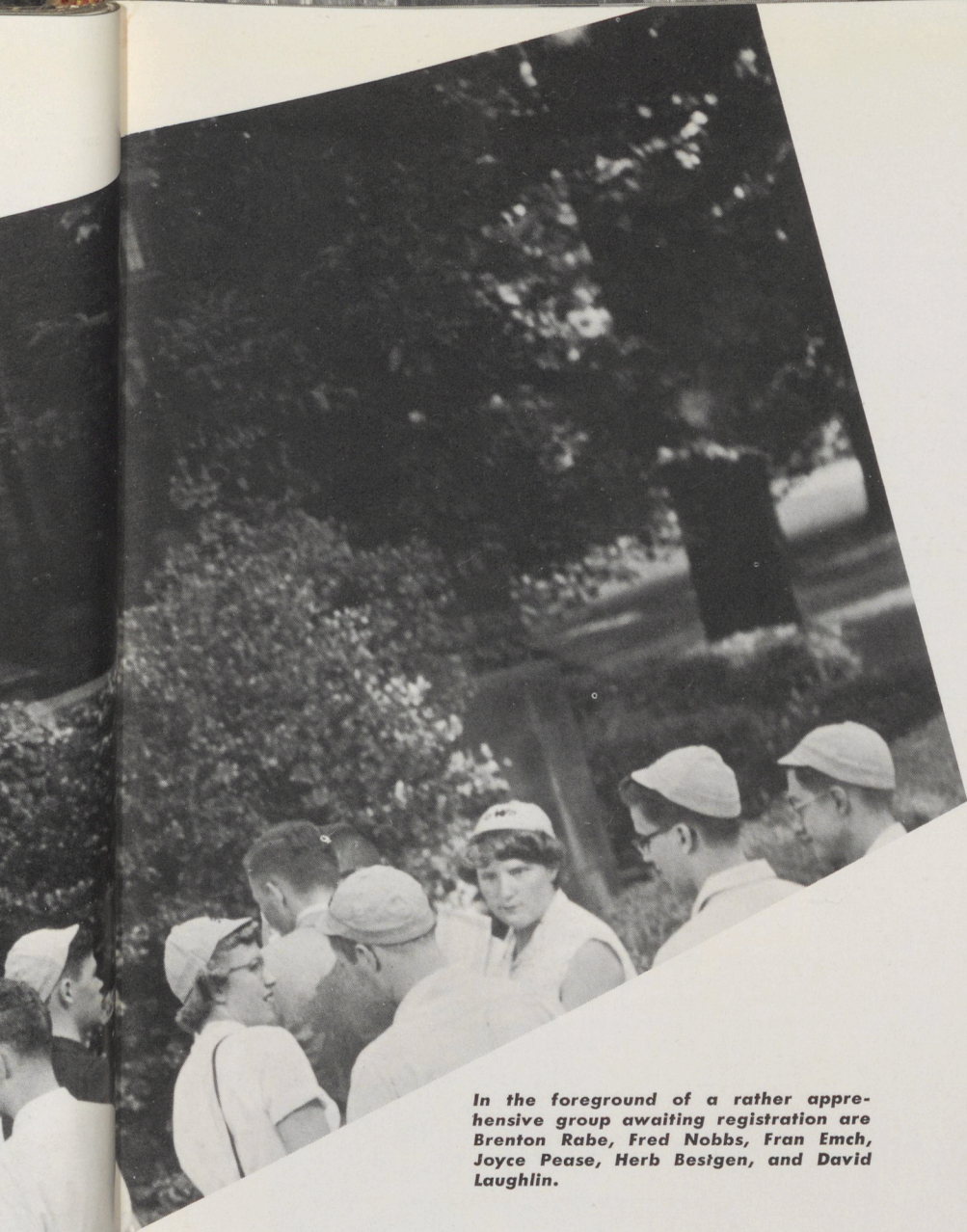

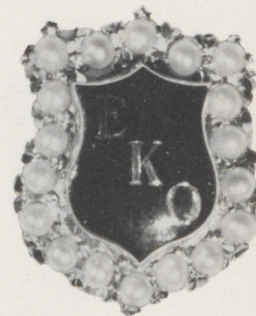

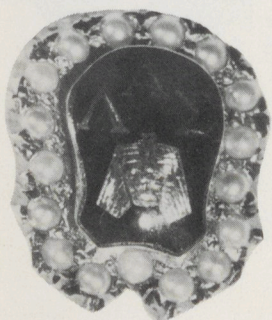

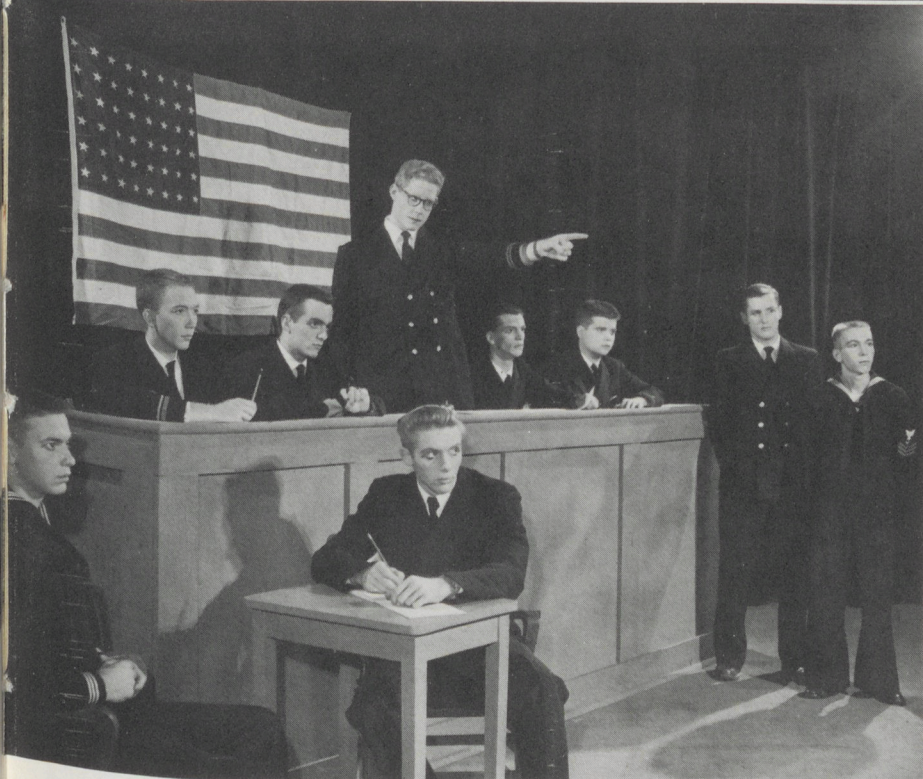

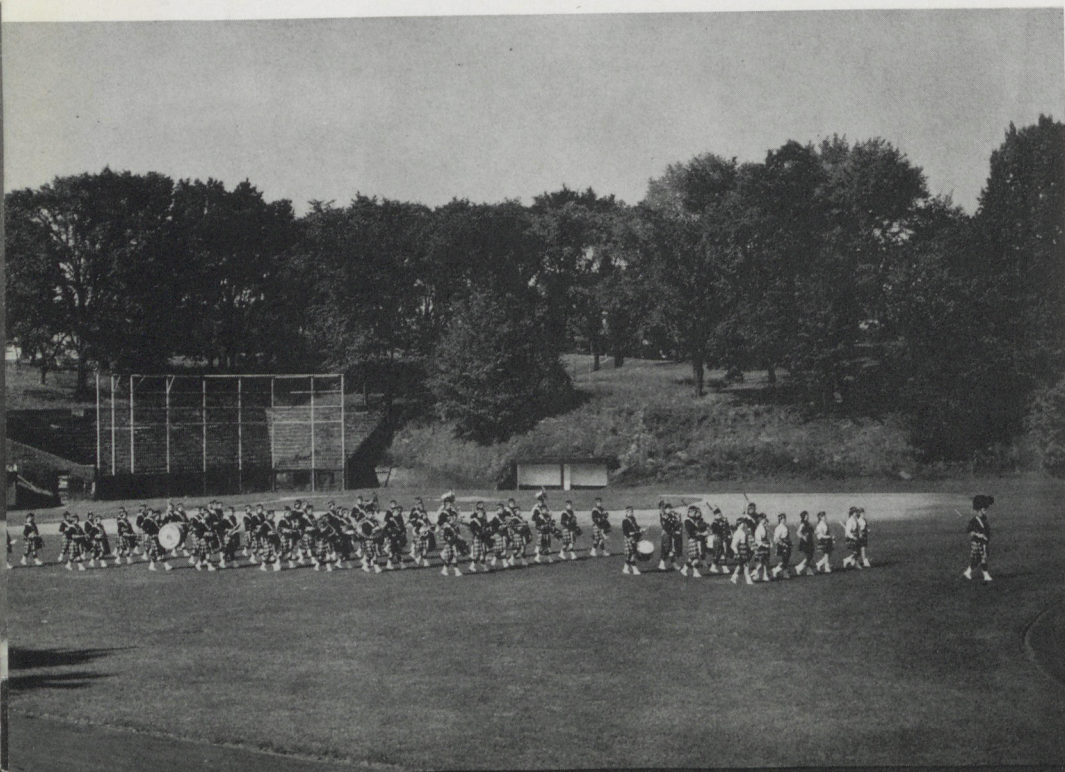

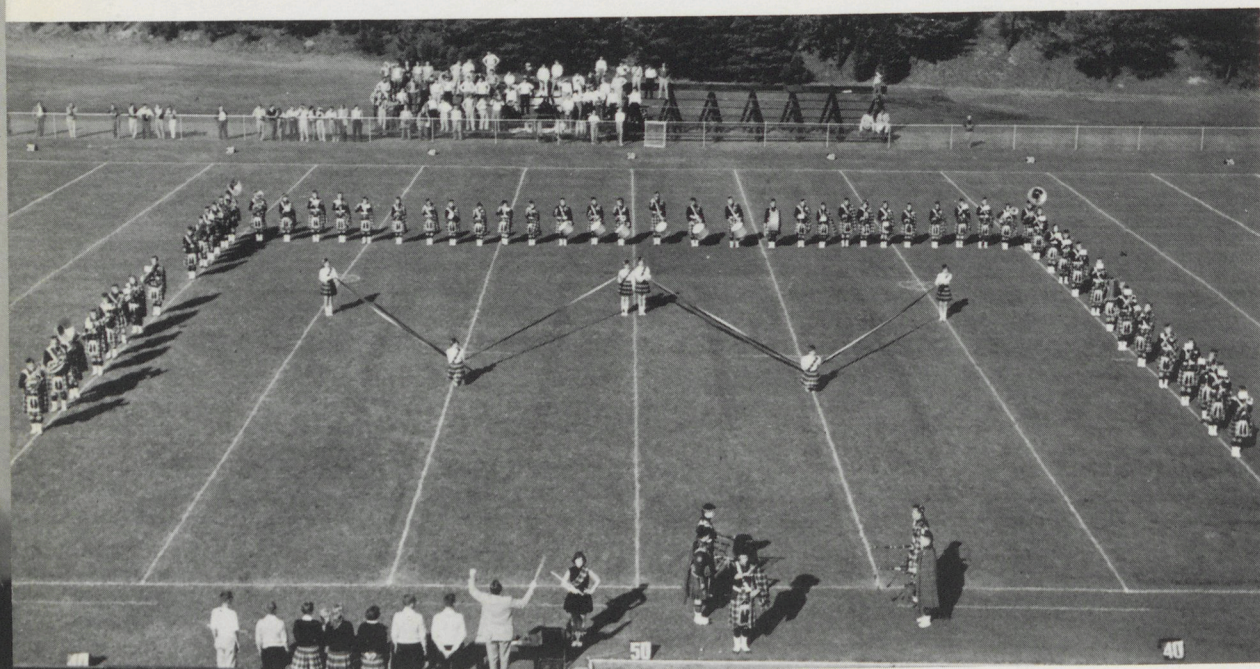

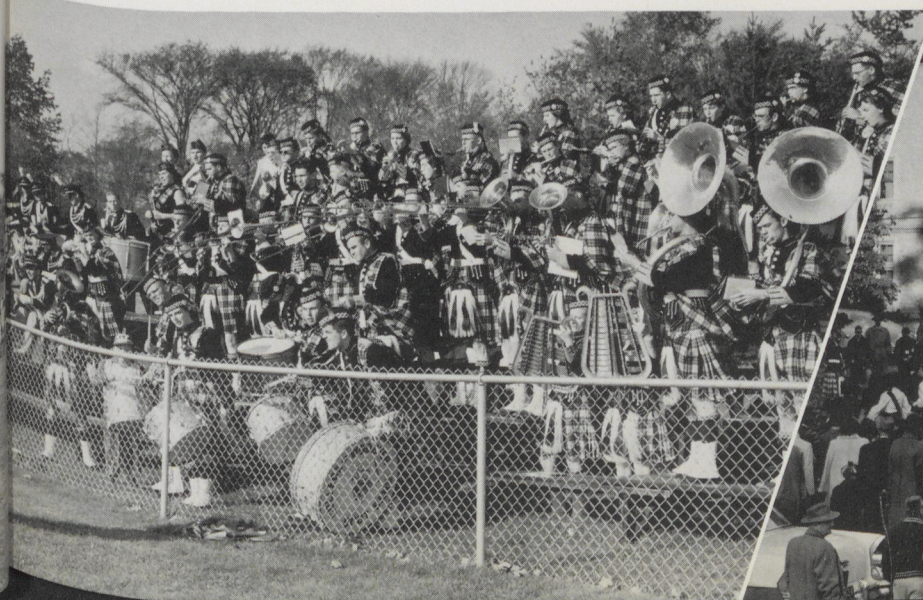

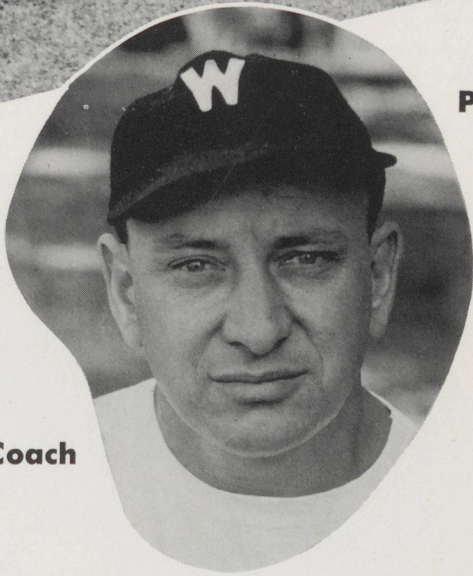
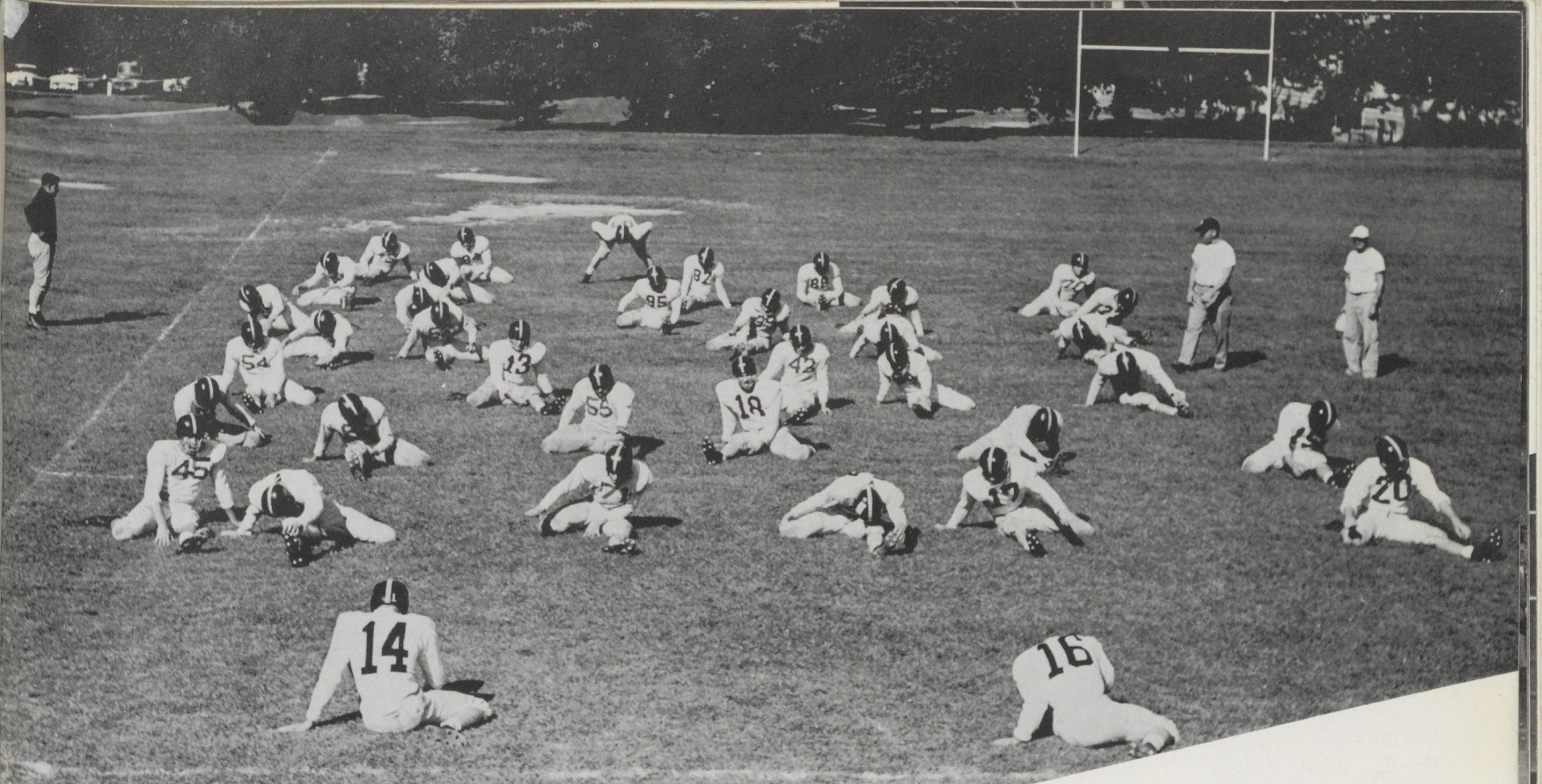


Football at Wooster finds its value chiefly in two aspects of the campus life: the same two aspects upon which it is dependent on thousands of college campuses across the country every fall. The panoramic presentation of such pageantry appeals to the spectators as does the exercise of mind, body, and spirit to the competing athletes. It is, perhaps only slightly unfortunate that these two "reasons d'être," as it were, are followed by a whole host of less valid and perhaps more unsavory justifications. But in spite of the pressures of the coaches, students, and alumni, the Wooster ballplayer manages to have fun at the game beyond the call of duty. The athletes put on a show of athletic skill brought to an edge by good coaching and, whether the record of the team is good or bad, this serves to make a period of three or four Saturdays a year a time of great entertainment for all who attend. For those of us who sit in the stands either during or after college, football is a return to youth. For a few minutes on the weekends, we may let our egos take part quite safely in the blood warming joy of a Wooster touchdown or the heart-wrenching of defeat. The nicest part of all is that, except for a few, everyone forgets the intensity of the feeling that swayed them during the battle and chooses to remember those highlights that were most striking in their context.

To help us remember we recall here the hours of practice and drilling that break in the muscles and sharpen the timing of men who joust on Saturdays. They find that they love the game as they take their showers after the workouts and they discover the desire to play harder the next day.

This year Tom Dingle, a freshman, and Dick Jacobs, a senior, with their great speed and shiftiness typified the running attack of the Wooster Scots as, along with shifty Junior Tommy Justice, they swept the ends time and time again for tremendous yardage that stunned the opponents and posed an inside-outside threat because of their ability to take advantage of a quick opening. Bobby Bush, back from the service after two years' absence, again made his accurate toe and heads-up running a team standard. He shared the honors with Dick Baragry, a fast and tricky senior, hard-hitting sophomore Stan Galehouse, and "Babe" Weiss, a promising powerful sophomore.

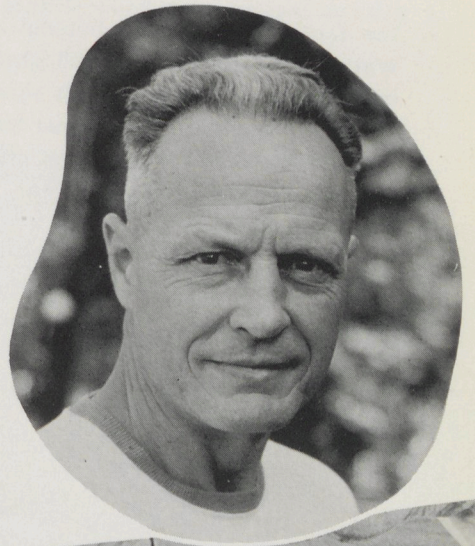

The season began on a hopeful note as Wooster roundly trounced Allegheny College, 41-13. Bolstered by this victory and one over Kenyon, 27-0, Wooster fans were nevertheless hesitant about predicting a win over the Waynesburg eleven. In true college tradition the men in black were again victorious by a score of 27-12. Going to Denison Wooster fans were again pessimistic. The Big Red of Denison were always a powerful competitor, but Wooster again came through with a tense 21-19 victory.





With Homecoming Weekend's excitement over the Queen and alumni, and the team's winning streak of four games, the man in the bleachers hoped noncommittally for a victory. All his hopes were to no avail, for Muskingum relentlessly scored touchdown after touchdown to rack up a score of 35-14. Except for a few sensational plays by the Scots, Muskingum had the day. The Scots played a confused and mistake-ridden game against Akron, where they were neither overpowered nor outplayed, but overwhelmingly defeated by a score of 53-6. This loss was too much for the team and it bounced back the next week with a convincing win over Mt. Union, 27-13. Playing next against an undermanned Hiram squad, Wooster won 35-12 in a romp. In the last game against Oberlin on Parents' Day, Dingle clinched the Conference lead in rushing, and the Scots won the game. Win or lose, 1955 was an exciting year for Wooster fans who can look forward to an equally exciting year in 1956.

Starting with a nucleus of eight returning lettermen, coach Riebe built a creditable team with the help of several promising freshmen and returning subs.

The Scot nine, stressing aggressive ballplaying and scrappiness, started the season with a surprise win over the powerful team of Kent State by the score of 3-1. They followed this win up with one over Fenn by a shutout score of 4-0. After that one, however, the game Scots lost six straight to Muskingum 5-2, Kenyon 4-3, Mount Union 22-2, Allegheny 1-0, Kenyon 13-1, and Akron 6-2. 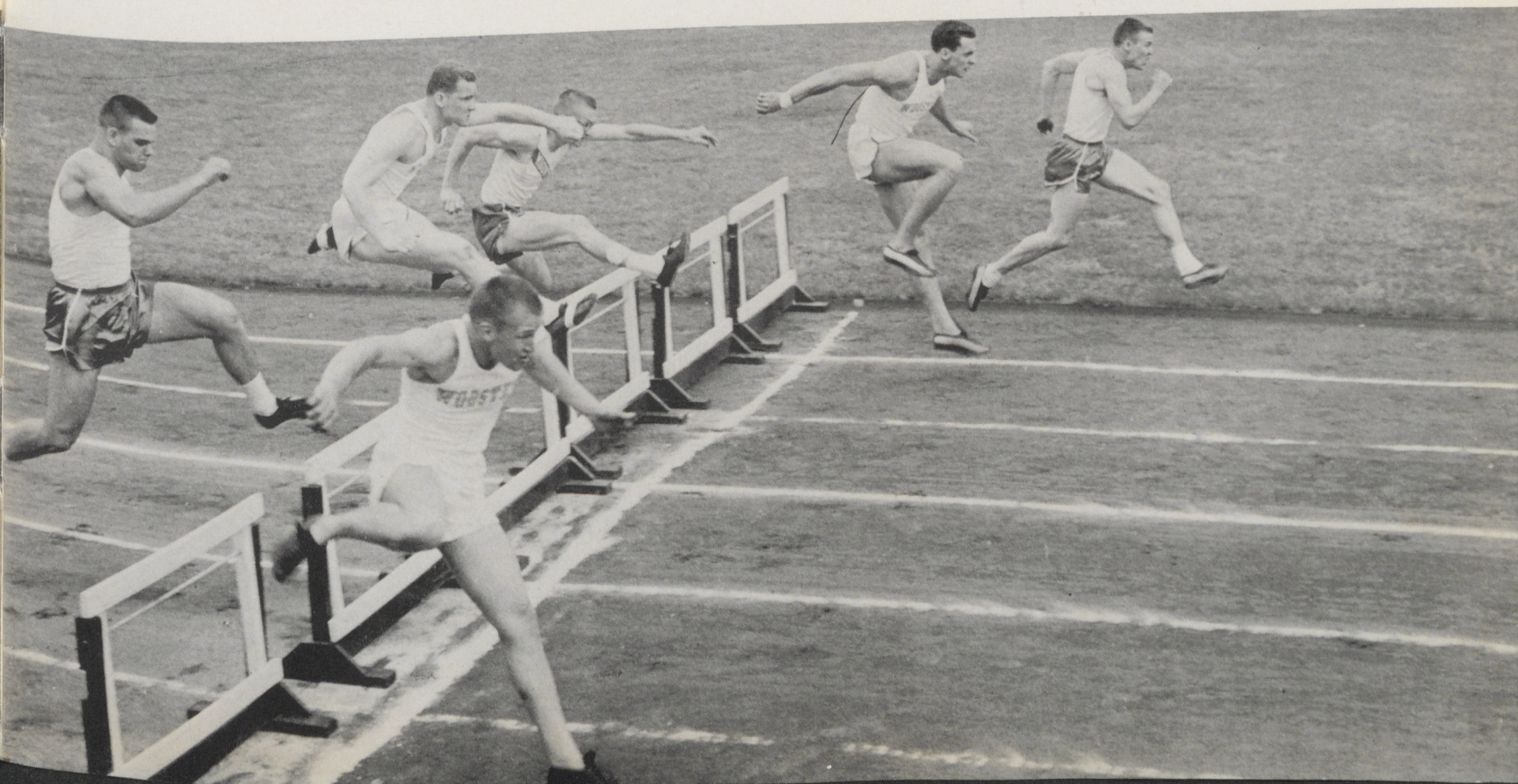


Track at Wooster was disappointing this year as the Wooster trackmen under the able coaching of Carl Munson, colorful track mentor at Wooster for many years, won only two of six dual meets. They also placed second in a triangular meet and ninth among the twelve teams competing in the Ohio Conference meet. Fortunately, the Color Day performance at Wooster was one of the two better showings as the "Munsemen" upset favored Mt. Union 73 1/2-53 1/2.



For twelve events in this meet the score was close but Wooster pulled away to a twenty point margin at the end. The season's other victory was gained at the expense of Hiram whom the Scots trounced 74-53. In a dual meet with Denison, Ohio Conference champions-to-be-at-that-time, Wooster got a taste of the Big Red's power as the Scots lost 95-32 in the first meet of the season. Other dual meet losses were to Muskingum 43-34, Akron 81-46, and Oberlin 94 1/2-32 1/2. Ohio Wesleyan, last year's conference champs, scored 85 points to Wooster's 64 and Ashland's 10, while easily winning Wooster's only triangular meet.

At the Ohio Conference meet in Granville where the Big Red of Denison was host on its own Deed's field, Denison won with a total of 43 points. Second and third places were won by Ohio Wesleyan and, a surprise, Akron, who had 33 1/2 and 31 1/2 respectively. The other teams in order were Muskingum with 30 1/2, Heidelberg with 27, Capitol with 24 3/4, Oberlin with 20 1/4, Mt. Union with 6, Wooster with 5 and Hiram with 3 1/2. Wittenberg and Otterbein, two other entries, failed to score.





In looking forward to 1956, the Scot fan sees a hopeful picture. Fred Mc Kirachan is the only senior letterman. What with stellar performers like spectacular and colorful workhorse Gerry Smith and reliable performers such as Bob Rafos, Chuck Schneider, Bill Stoops, John Gardner, Cliff Amos, and Rod Buckson all returning, the prospects seem very bright. Add to this the fact that many of the other men should show improvement and Wooster may be on its way to an excellent season in track.
