The further Demands and Propositions of the generalt Councell of the Army.

7 Hereas Denzill Hollis Elq. Lionel Copley. Fiq. Major Gen. Maffey; and others of your Members, (whole Names you well know) were in the year 1647. impeached by your felves for Treafon, or for high Crimes and Mifdemeanors, in relation on to the Treafonable Engagement in the City of London, the violence then done upon the Parliament, and the levying of a new Warr, and other evills in maintenance and profecution thereof; and upon clear proofs against them, were by your censure expelled the Houfe, and difabled from further truft therein, and upon new Writs iffued out new Members were chofen and return'd in some of their roomes; and yet by the prevalance of their Faction (When in the last Summers Warr divers faithfull Members were ing sged abroad upon necessary publique service, and others through Malignant Tumults and Disturbances could not fafely attend the Houfe) the fame perfons were afterwards re-admitted to fit in the House, and Vote as formerly, without any triall or fatisfaction in the things whereof they were accused: We demand, that all those Members fo impeached, may be forthwith fecured, to be brought to Justice or Triall for their faid Crimes ; and that fuch others of their Faction, by whole Votes Councells and Confederacie, they were fo re-admitted, may be fecluded from the House, and not fit as Judges for those their confederates.

2. Whereas by the Confederacy of Maj. G. Brown now Sheriff of London, with the faid Impeached Mem-A 2 bers

bers and others, the Scots were invited and drawn in to invade this Kingdome the laft Summer, infomuch as when upon the actuall Invation the Houfe proceeded to declare them Enemies, and those that adhered to them Troytors; yet the faid Confederates and other treacherous Members (to the number of Ninety and odde, as upon the division of the House appeared) did by their Councels and Votes endeavour to hinder the House from declaring against their confederate Invaders; We defire, That the faid Maj. Gen. Brown may be alfo fecured and brought to judgement, for that and other his treacherous Confederacies or Correspondencies with the publique and declared Enemies of the Kingdome (which we hereby charge him with, and shall be ready to make proof of) And that the reft of the Ninety and odde perfons diffenting in the faid Vote, may be excluded the Houfe, and not trufted further in your Councels.

3. Whereas in a continued Series of your proceedings for many moneths together, we have feen the prevalence of the fame treacherous, corrupt and divided Councels, through Factions and private Interefts, oppofing or obstructing Justice in all kinds, diverting your Councels from any thing of publique good, hindring any proceedings to any fuch Settlement, as would confift with fecurity to the publique Interest, or put a reall end to the Troubles, Burthens or Hazards, of the Kingdome, and precipitating into treacherous and deftructive Compliances and Conjunctions with the acknowledged Enemies thereof; and this we have feen particularly in the corrupt Councels and Refolves of receding from, and recalling the Votes of No more Address to the King, &c. (the justneffe and necefficy whereof you had once fo cleared or Sheriff of London, with the flid Impeached Mem-

to the world) also in the Votes for entertaining or feeking (after all that) a perfonall Treaty with the King your Prisoner, upon such Propositions as himfelfe should tender, as well as your own, offring upon imperfect (and those but wrested) Concessions from him, to restore him, with impunity, to Honor, Freedome, Safety, and his Revenue, exempting all (even the principall) Authors and Actors in the last Summers Warr from capitall Punissent or Triall, and bringing off the rest with Fines or Censures most inconfiderable to the publique Damage and Mischief they have done; whereby both they and others are encouraged to renew and multiply the Kingdomes Troubles.

The 6.of Decemb. was prefented to the Generall Councell of the Army, certain heads with many Officers thought fit to be infifted on for a good and fpeedy fettlement of the Kingdome.

I That the King, that capitall deftroyer of, and fhedder of the blood of fome hundred thousands of his good people in Engiand and Ireland, may be brought to publike Juffice.

2 That fome of the principall Actors, now in your hand, may have publike justice done upon them for the innocent blood they have spilt.

3 That the principall actors and abettors in bringing in the Scots Army (if found out) may be brought to justice.

4 That no Negative Voices may be used in this Kingdom against the Peoples Freedom and just Liberty.

5 That the Rights and Liberties of the free-born People of England be vindicated and cleared.

6 That there may be a more just and equall way for election

election of Burgeffes to the Parliament.

7 That Free-quarters be taken off, and the Kingdom eafed of their burthen.

8 That the Revenue of the Common-wealth, by Excise, Deans and Chapters lands, Forreft lands, and the eftates of Delinquents, and the parts of Papifts lands, according to their eftates fo forfeited in any City or County, be for the conftant pay of the Army by affignation, according to the Eftablifhment for Defence of the Kingdome, and fatisfying all publique debts and dammages thereof.

9 That a Treafurer, with two or three Commiffioners, in each County, City or Riding, be appointed for fuch fervice, with fome of the Army, or fuch as they fhall appoint to be joyned with them, whereby the Revenue of the Kingdom may be more certainly known; and not converted to private uses as heretofore, under an oath for their faithfull discharging of their trust, allowing them for their paines two pence in the pound, and no more.

to That all Committees, Commissioners and Sequestrators be taken away, and some strict course for bringing them to account, with all Treasurers and Collectors fince the beginning of this Parliament.

11 That abuses in Courts of justice be reformed; That the People have justice at their own doores for petty Actions.

12 That an Office be fet up in every County for the Filing of all Deeds, Bargains and Contracts within fuch place where the Land lies; Bargain or Contract made, be registred in fuch City or County, for the cafe and benefit of the People.

13 That the Clerk of the Peace for each City and County do take an Oath for the due execution of the

fame :

fame; and that four pence be allowed him for the registring of every Deed, Bargain or Contract, with the like fum of four pence for every Search.

14 That fiee Trade may be incouraged, and fome fricter courie taken to protect Merchants, that they be not robbed and fpoiled of their effates at Sea by English and Irish Pirats.

15 That it may be made death to tranf, ort Wooll, Yaro, or Fullers carth beyond Seas.

16 That Tythes belonging to the Clergy be taken away, and a land-rate thorow the Kingdom in every Parifh, equal by value to Tithes, for their maintenance.

17 That fome publike place, in every City or County for a Treasury, be kept for that end onely; and the Just ices of the Peace for fuch ity or County, to receive and pay them their feverall proportions, as shall arife out of every Parish, to the Ministers of the taid place quarterly.

18 That the fix Clarks Office be taken away, for their intolerable exactions of eight pence a fheet, for every Bill and Anfaet filing in that Court, and ten fhillings for every Commission.

That the Clerks belonging to the Chancery, may be fworn Attourneys of that Court, who may be alloweducopence a flicet for every Bill and Anfwer drawing, and half a crown for every Commission.

20. That all Finall Lawes may be reviewed, what fhall be thought deftructive to the people, may be taken away; and what fhall be thought neceflary, to be continued, fuch penalty may be imployed for the publike use of every County or City, where the offence fhall be committed.

Moft of these Members being feized on at the house doore, or coming to it, they were carried into the Queenes Court, where a Colonell of the Army came to them, and told them that the Army had Orders for what was done, whereupon the Members submitted, and after a time some of them were carryed to a victuaalling house called Hell, and others to VVallingford house over against VVhitehall.
