3 A true List of the Commanders and severall Colours of everie Regiment of the honourable Citie of London, now lately chosen by a Committee for the Militia of the said Citie. Also two Orders, one concerning the City Souldiers from both Houses, the other concerning Voluntiers, from the House of Commons.

### Die Martis, 3. Maii 1642.

ORdered by the Lords and Commons in Parliament affembled: That the persons intrusted with the ordering of the Militia of the City of London, shall have power to draw the Trained Bands of the City into such usuall and convenient places within three miles of the said City, as to them from time to time shall seeme sit, for the Trayning and Exercising of the Souldiers; and that the said Souldiers upon Summons shall from time to time appeare and not depart from their Colours without the consent of their Officers, as they will answer their contempt to the Farliament.

#### His Majelties Letter to the Major of Kingston upon Hull, the 25. of April, 1642. s the exist way in thatige, according to the

To Our trusty and welbeloved, the Major, Aldermen, and Burgesses of Our Town and Port of King from upon Hull.

> Rufty and well beloved, We greet you well, whereas Wee have bin long fenfible of the just complaints and great Burdens of Our

Subjects in these Northern parts, by occasion of the Garrison in our Town of Hull; and whereas We were on Friday the 22, of this Moneth petitioned by divers of the Gentry, and others, Inhabitants of this County, That the Munition at Hall might remain in the Magazine there, for the lecurity of Our Person, and of all these Northern parts. their Feares being much grounded upon the Pa I aments Relations of forreign Invalions: Vpon which, the more to express Our care of Our peoples lafety, We did our felf go in perton to har our Town, that upon our own view We might confult what proportion of it might bee fitly removed upon any preffing occasion, having a respect to the promised supply for Scotland, the necessary use of Arms for Ireland as well as for the foreguard and satisfaction of these Northern parts. But much contrary to our expectation, and the Dury and Allegiance of our Subjects, we found the Gates of that our Town thut, and the Bridges drawn up against Vs; and though We came in a paccable way, repoling the greatest Confidence in the Love and Loyalty of our People, by offering (as we did) to put our own Perion, and our two Sonnes, but with 20. Horse, into that Town, there being in it a Carrison of about 800. Souldiers; Yet We were not onely denyed entrance, but in a warlike manner opposed by Sir loke Hotham, the armed men buing place I in all the Ports, and about all the Walls of the Town alleadging (though falfly) for his excuse, the Convmand of the Parliament, and being presied by Vs to thew fight an Order in Writing he could not doc it, for We were very confident that there was never any publike Order of theirs, that could formuch as imply a denyall to Our admillion: We knowing well enough that hee was entruited by them for a Quard and Security of that place against all forreign E temies, or chose at home who are diffaffacted in Religion & not ig inft his natural Soveraign, Which boffile Opposition and actuall Levying of War against our person, being by the Statute of 25. Ed. 3. sna fed high Treafons which Statute confidered, and that for the avoyding of all lealouses, as We have faid, We were content to have bin admitted with fo very imall a number in our Company, We were thereupon conftrained to proclaim the faid fir I ba Hotham & all thote

that thould adhere to or affift him. Traytors. Of all which abovef id patieges,

We have acquainted our Parliament, demanding Instice to be done upon him, that they might thereby have opportunity to vindicate the imputation laid on them by sir loba Hatham, and We the easier way to chastize, according to the Law, so high a Treason, And less a mis-understanding of Our inventions, or of the Law may misguide, our loyall and wel-affected Subjects, the Inhabitants, Captains, Officers, o riculdiers is that To whe, VVe have thought fit to commend to your candidate ton the aforeful statute, with that of the eleventh

V Vherein it is declared, by the unanimous Assent of Parliament, That the Subjects of this Realm are bound, by the Duty of Allegiance, to serve the King for the time being, for the defence of His Persin and the Land, against every Ribellion, M git, or Power rai ed against Him and with His Majesty to enter or abide in Service in B attell, if cause so require. And it was therefore then enacted, That from the no for heappers in what soever that so ill attend upon the King, or be in place, by His command within or without the Land. That for the same deed and true service of Allegiance, he, and they he no way attaint or convict of high Treason, or of other Off need for that Cause, hy any Processe of Law, whereby he, or any of them shill lose or forseit Lives, Lands, Tenements, Goods, or any thing; but be for that Deel and Se vice utierly discharged of any vexasion, trouble, or is see and if any Ast or Acts, or other Processe of Law thereupon for the same happen to be made contrary to this Ordinance, that then that Act or Acts, or other Pro-

ceffe of the Law what oever they shall be, stand and be utterly voyd.

All which, together with the Copies of Our Message and Petition ( which VVe fend here inclosed ) We require you to publish to the Inhabitants, and all fuch Com manders and Souldiers as will heare them: That knowing both the Perill of the Law on the one fi 'e, and the fecurity of fuch as shall adhere to Vs on the other, they be not milled (through ignorance) to decline their Allegimee; and that the Souldi rs may lay down their Arms, and admit Our entrance in a peaceable way. In fo doing, you shall bot a discharg your duties, an I those that the libive need, be affured to find ( upon such their submitfion) Our ready Mercy and pardon And We doe likewife require, & charge al you, the inhibitants (is wel Stuldiers as others) upon your Allegiance, That you pamit not any part of our Magazin or Munition to bee removed or transported out of that Towns ider any presence of Order or Power whatfiever, without ou Royal Affent in writing under Our Hand. Affuring you, That it wil be much more pleafing to Vs to have Occasion administed by the Fide ity of the Inhabitants to enlarge those Graces and Immunities granted to that Town by Our predecessors, then to have any occasion to question your Charter.
